Topic: Persecution of Global Christian Population

The General Assembly,

Noting the extreme levels of hatred and persecution faced by Christians around the globe,

Alarmed that the population of Christians in the Middle East has dropped from 20 percent of the population to 5 percent population in recent years,

Noting with Zest that the Bible is strictly forbidden in 52 countries around the globe, such as in the Peoples' Republic of China, and in many countries across the Middle East such as Saudi Arabia,

Deeply Disturbed that Christians face the death penalty in North Korea, and that Muslims in Saudi Arabia who convert to Christianity are put to death as well,

Emphasizing the growing number attacks committed against Christians around the globe, such as in the Easter attacks in Sri Lanka,

Deeply Concerned with the persecution of Christians by Islamic migrants into Europe, and with many counties' refusal to investigate these crimes in the name of tolerance and political correctness,

Recognizing that most migrants to Europe are peaceful people,

Declaring that radical Islamic terror groups such as ISIS are still a threat to global peace and to the well being of non-Christians,

1. Denounces all forms of persecution against Christians around the world;
2. Demands that all 52 countries of the globe who prohibit ownership of the Bible lift their ban on the Bible, including the People' Republic of China
3. Establishes the Task Force for the Investigation of Crimes Committed by Migrants (TFICM), which will have the following duties;
 - a. Spread awareness on the danger that some large groups of migrants pose to European society;
 - b. Conduct independent investigations on reported crimes committed by migrants to Europe against a native of that country;
 - c. Lobby for all nations of Europe to stop ignoring reports of crimes committed by migrants against the native populace;
4. Hoping that all religions of the world can come together and bring an end to religious persecution.
